

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The Smart Cities Research Initiative - a small group of cities and related services is involved as an advisory group. Common industry challenges that they work on with industry stakeholders. Work is voluntary. They create working groups. She works on the engineer side of the house but is not an engineer. They promote things that they want adopted throughout industry.

Some aspects related to smart cities. Her group is focused on technology.

In 2017, CTIA started programming initiatives centered around "Connected Life."

The Smart Cities Business & Technology Program was founded as a way to convene the business members of the wireless industry, collaborate and create best practices, and educate municipalities in the hopes of increasing smart city deployments and adoption.

Today, our Program convenes 100+ wireless smart cities experts specializing in the areas of Public Services/Safety, Transportation, and Utilities.

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Now that everything is connected, there is a need to bring everyone together, not just with wireless devices but with the whole IoT.

The Smart Cities program helps members convene from engineering and development...in terms of cities.

They have over 100 groups in their program. They don't define a smart city but look at a city as a platform.

Smart Cities Research Initiative

Started initially as a small task force to help identify and approve educational materials, this public-sector group is made up of city leaders, safety officials, CIOs, CTOs, academic institutions, and like-minded non-profit organizations. These individuals help inform our works and participate in our member events and outreach.

They have a small task force with a roster of cities willing to participate with them and vet ideas and give feedback on usefulness. Some cities have CIOs and CTOs and usually that is who they can work with. Stuart has gone with them to visit city officials and collaborate with them.

The Town Square initiative is a new platform that anyone can join. It will help raise awareness of their public work and smart city deployments. She provided a link to the Town Square website: https://smartcities.ctia.org/

They also have launched a smart cities playbook. It is available to any city that asks for it.

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Charter: We are a group focused on the advancement of smart utility solutions to help communities improve utility performance and mitigate costs, generate additional value, and increase the quality of life for citizens.

Advanced technologies offer a variety of benefits to the utility space including fiber and cellular network management, deployment services, energy/water plant efficiencies, and data/asset management.

Our group consists of a variety of companies specializing in energy, gas, and water services, deployment, engineering, procurement, and construction as well as network operators.

Leadership







Aaron Snyder asked about the wireless mesh. Michelle said that is a choice but for point to mutli point is more secure.

Aaron said he is working with international groups and they favor wired solutions. He said often they have a mix of wired and wireless.

Dave LeVee said he is working with the committee but is a bit of an outlier. He said if you get the pricing right, which is very complex and difficult, if looking at time and location specific pricing - thinking from a wholesale standpoint and location marginal pricing, - it is very volatile and changes rapidly. He asked if there is thought about pricing with value creation. Michelle said her group doesn't discuss price but may discuss how it works. Various levels of secure technologies might be something they cover.

Karen Studarus said she would like to get a copy of the Smart Cities playbook.

Action: If allowed, distribute the CTIA Smart Cities playbook to the GWAC.

Andy Bordine said he liked the information about wireless. He straddles both technical and regulatory. He noted the rural broadband initiatives coming out. Fiber is the middle mile and wireless is the grid edge. He would like to talk with CTIA more.

Ron Ambrosio asked about a fiber backbone with a wireless last mile - with or without wire mesh technology.

Michelle said they don't dictate the evolution of that, but they instruct their members on having constructive conversations. She noted that not everyone will move at the same time. She discussed

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various infrastructure choices to support utility infrastructure. She said her group lobbies for enough spectrum for everyone for their use cases and to have an eye to how to approach infrastructure in various situations such as new builds and retrofits. She said the members drive what happens next. Some will move faster than others.

David Forfia thanked Michelle James and her team for the presentation today and for addressing the questions from the group. He also thanked Stuart McCafferty for inviting Michelle to speak.


Michelle James thanked GWAC for the opportunity to speak to the group.

David Forfia asked about the October Meeting minutes from the Fall GWAC meeting. Susie said the minutes have been distributed to the GWAC by email.

David asked for a motion to approve the GWAC October minutes.

Leonard Tillman gave the motion to approve the minutes and Ron Ambrosio seconded the motion.

There was no discussion and the meeting minutes were unanimously approved.



Karen Studarus reminded everyone of the TESC call at Noon PT today in which IEEE staff will demonstrate the IEEE TESC20 platform. She said that the platform is a hybrid between the virtual lobby and individual meetings, and asynchronous chat. The conference will utilize Engagez for the virtual

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conference and WebEx for live chat discussions after each session including the poster session. The platform will be live starting November 30 and will remain available for one month after the event including the presentation materials, chat sessions, recorded panels and poster sessions.

Karen reminded the group that the workshops will be shorter than in the past so we will need to be very efficient with our time. Moderators for each panel session have been identified from the GWAC group.

Karen asked if there were questions related to moderators and presenters.

Karen reminded the group that the TESC20 Organizing Committee meets every Monday. But offered the GWAC to discuss the meeting format and other points if needed in this meeting.

Leonard Tillman said he had a meeting with his session panel this meeting. They were hoping to have a bit more clarity on the workshop. Leonard is interested in audience participation.

Karen said the more the moderator can center the Q&A around thought-provoking questions that steer toward GWACs future direction, looking at the seven conference topics, will be helpful. Karen would like moderators to send proposed questions to the organizing committee for review and feedback.

Action: Moderators to send their proposed Panel Session Questions to Karen and to the Organizing committee in advance.

Leonard Tillman asked about recordings. Karen said that all Q&A sessions will be recorded, and the participants will be notified by the platform at the beginning of each Q&A session that the recordings are taking place. The questions will go out ahead of the Q&A Session.

David asked if other than prompting for the questions, is there a need for the second moderator to take notes or do mind mapping. Karen said that would be something to consider. She asked the group what they would like to see based on prior workshops.

David noted that in the past we did take down notes from the Q&A discussion sessions including a summary of the discussion. He asked for more ideas.

Ron Ambrosio said that this meeting will be significantly different than past meetings and time is more limited so we can't use prior workshops as a guide. He said that having things very structured including having relevant pre-written questions for discussion is a good idea to get things moving very quickly.

Ron C. said we need to capture ideas from the participant. He thinks the mind map would be too cumbersome and would stall the discussions or distract from them.

Ron A. said we will have the recordings afterwards if needed. Each Q&A session will be only about 30 minutes.

David asked what will show on the screen during the discussion. Ron A. said the pre-determined questions would be good to show during the workshop discussion.

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Ron B. said we will only have 4 to 6 questions per panel session and that would be a good place to start. The questions and discussions could be returned to the council by email after the conference.

Acton: First draft of questions to be submitted to the organizing committee and turned in the Tuesday before Thanksgiving. Questions should be relevant to the conference theme and panel theme should provide direction to the GWAC for future direction of industry. Questions should aim to generate as many new ideas as possible.

Ron A. thought the questions developed in advance should be on the screen during the Q&A time. He thought the moderator should start with the questions created in advance.

David asked if we could get questions turned in between now and next Tuesday (before Tuesday).

Karen asked about the questions. Ron A said the questions should be relevant to this year's conference theme. Ron B. said they should provide direction to the GWAC for new engagement, be thought provoking, and what would move GWAC forward with an eye to what will move the industry forward as well.

David agreed that they should center around the future of GWAC and should generate as much content as possible.

Karen noted the virtual paper session which will be at the end of Day 2. She said the abstract and paper will be available in the platform as well as a prerecorded 5-minute pre-recorded video. Authors will stand by in a WebEx meeting to discuss their talk with others. The format is cool. WebEx will facilitate this well.

Karen reminded everyone to register for the conference. So far about 50 have registered.

Action: ask Rosanne about our two tutorial speakers



They hope to have it published before the conference so that it can be referenced from the conference. Ron also noted that the TESC Conference tutorial on TE Fundamentals is using the flow and format of the FAQ as the basis of the tutorial.

Grid Future States will meet this Friday - Ron Cunningham said there is a lot of additional assessment to do. For the conference they will go over key talking points for the GWAC foundational session. They key part is that the paper for the effort will be moved into the first half of next year. They will look for other work and deliverables. The core team will continue to do their task in preparation for the conference.

Karen said the new GWAC website is moving slower than we had hoped but she is pushing to finalize it in the next couple weeks.

<u>Karen said the GWAC met to provide a unified feedback response but was not able to provide that input</u> in time for the NARUC deadline.

<u>David said they must follow the process of the federal register notice, but they are always happy to get feedback.</u> They will just put it in a different bucket than the federal register notice.

David Forfia noted he received positive feedback from the former NARUC president Nick Wagner last week on this document.

ISO/IEC JTC Ken Wacks is not available today.

EPRI - Gerald Gray - was not available today.

ASHRAE - Ron B. is getting ready to publish a specifications guide related to grid interactive systems tie in to building management systems through things like webservices. They hope to have that by the new year. For CTA (Consumer Technology Association) which he will chair next year, they are working on brainstorming for new areas of support for interactive home and building networking systems with outside systems such as grid services. This relates to the GWAC SBATH paper. Ron suggested that at a future meeting we bring in the technical chair of CTA and have him speak to the GWAC. This would be sometime early in 2021, possibly in February. Ron B. will work on setting that up.

EBC - David Forfia noted they are working on some of the DER use cases and data exchange for registration. He is helping the Consortium with this process.

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NARUC - Chris Villarreal announced the new NARUC head will be Paul Kjellander of Idaho PUC. He said that NARUC usually has a one-year theme but in this case, they were able to come up with a multi-year theme in conjunction with future leaders who are now in supporting leadership roles.

The multi-year theme is on innovative disruptive technology and regulation. It is focused on exploring the many different emerging technologies and innovations affecting electricity, natural gas, telecommunications, water and wastewater utilities.

Chris said the National policy conference scheduled for the first full week of December. He will look for opportunities for GWAC to work with them. The group includes governor's offices, legislators, environmental regulators, state energy offices and consumer advocates.

The meeting will start on Dec. 7 with a talk by FERC on Order 2222. There will be a fireside chat on Tuesday with NARUC Paul Kjellander. Mark Paterson and Tanya Barham will be involved with that and will discuss what the future of the system is going to look like. There is no cost to attend. It is a public meeting.

Ron B. asked if any of the meeting will be recorded? Chris will check and let us know but he doesn't think that it is.

Ron B. mentioned that the DOE Building Technology Office (BTO) is hosting their preview of building technologies for energy related activities. He has been sitting in on those meetings. Some technologies related to equipment within the home environment becoming smarter, smart cities and topics related to energy, communication, integration, management and interaction with grid services. There are some funding opportunities coming for innovators. If he finds a link to a summary of the meetings, he will share it with the GWAC. He said there was very good coverage of interoperability issues.

It is very relevant to the Consumer Technology Association, CTA, and to the future of GWAC.
